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What is Title I?

Title I is the largest federal aid program for elementary, middle, and high schools. Through Title I, money is given to school districts throughout the country based on the number of low-income families in each district. Each district uses its Title I money for extra educational services for children most in need of educational help. The focus of the Title I program is ensuring all students meet the same high standards expected of all children.

What will Title I do for my child?

The Title I program will provide your child with extra educational assistance beyond the regular classroom. The purpose of Title I is to: help every child receive a high quality education, build capacity for parent involvement, provide professional development for staff, and meet the requirements of “No Child Left Behind.”

How do schools receive Title I money?

Title I, Part A (Title I) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended (ESEA) provides financial assistance to local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards. Federal funds are currently allocated through four statutory formulas that are based primarily on census poverty estimates and the cost of education within each state.

- Universal and Tiered Instruction
- Instructional materials and supplies
- Additional teachers and paraprofessionals
- Parent teacher resources
- Class size reduction
- Summer school programs
- After-school programs

Title I Programs Generally Offer:

- Smaller classes or instructional spaces
- Additional highly-qualified teachers/ paraprofessionals
